MAYOR'S ADDRESS

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen City of Eastport.

Gentlemen:

While the figures in the treasurer's, auditor's and other officials' reports in this booklet will tell the story of the past year much more clearly than anything I can say, nevertheless, in accordance with long established custom, I respectfully submit this summary of what has been accomplished, and of what appear to me to be the outstanding needs of the city for the coming year.

Finances

While our administration may, like all others be subject to some criticism, there is one ground on which no criticism has been or can be, directed toward it. That is our handling of the city finances, which under circumstances made peculiarly difficult by reason of the non-payment of taxes, has been such as to deserve the approval of all.

Starting with a deficit on February 1, 1925, of more than \$8,000.00, due largely to the payment of bonds the previous year for which no appropriation had been made, we have met all our obligations without scrimping; and had the taxes come in as they usually have come, we would have left a substantial cash balance in the treasury on Feb. 1, 1926, for we expended some \$6000.00 less than the amount we appropriated.

This result was not by any means accidental. It was accomplished by closely watching our outlay

each month, with reference to the amount of money available for each account; and by the most painstaling scrutiny of all expenditures. Early in the year it was announced that our policy would be to live strictly within our appropriations, and this policy was adhered to, with the result that the overdrafts on all accounts amounted to only about \$1,000.00, while the unexpended balances totalled \$7,000.00, leaving a balance of \$6,000.00 on the economy side of the ledger.

One instance of the careful attention paid to business-like methods this year was the completion of the appropriations by the third week in May, whereas the usual date for completing them has been about a month later than that. Another instance was the arrangement with a local bank to handle loans at a lower rate of interest than is usually charged, and to allow the city two per cent on its daily balances. These are matters that will not perhaps seem of great import to the average citizen, but they will serve at least to show the spirit in which our financial affairs have been approached.

One recommendation seems appropriate here. The Bridge Loan of \$10,000.00, which had been carried by a Boston bank, was paid by the City Treasurer through a misunderstanding and without due autitorization of the City Council, from current funds. This account was thereby reduced to the rank of a current or floating debt, which defeated our efforts to refund it serially and to reduce it at the rate of \$1000 each year. We have paid on it, however, the \$1,600.00 received from the sale of the Alms House, and so cut it down to \$8,400.00. But some plan should be worked out for refunding it and amortizing it by some fixed amount each year. At any rate, it should be taken

out of the class of a floating debt or current loan, and placed where it belongs, in the recognized debt of the city.

Calhoun House

We found the old Alms House, at the beginning of the past year, in need of repairs that would have exceeded \$2,000.00 in amount if we had procee 1ed with them. The ell would have required almost complete rebuilding, including the construction of a cement foundation and a basement, and the installation of a furnace. The property would hardly have been worth that sum after the repairs had been com pleted, and would still have been unsuited in many ways for an alms house. We decided to take over the Calhoun House and to sell the Alms House. Accordingly the former was taken out of the hands of the Hospital Association, and with it \$525.00 it had earned in the form of rentals. This money we applied to making necessary minor repairs and the installation of a furnace. Then we sold the Alms House for \$1600. thus avoiding the expensive repairs it needed, and returning it to the class of taxable property. The net result is that we have a fine, commodious and well. equipped home for our poor, and are about \$4000.00 ahead of where we would have been had we decided to repair the Alms House.

Bridges

The South End Bridge, which had been in need of repairs for a long time, had finally arrived at a condition so bad that nothing less than rebuilding would serve. The work was placed in the hands of Contract

tor Joseph Mealey, and under his direction a fine workmanlike job was done at a cost of less than \$1000 This bridge is now in excellent condition, and should need no further attention or expense for several year

Sidewalks

Extensive repairs were made this year on the wooden sidewalks throughout the city, and they are in better shape now than for years past. One fine piece of cement sidewalk was built on Boynton Street, and this should be extended as soon as possible, to Water Street.

Sewers

While no new construction of consequence has been attempted this year, the present system of sewers has been kept in good condition. We purchased all the sewer pipe we needed for the year in a single carload shipment last spring, at wholesale rates, which saved about one third the ordinary retail price.

Street Lighting

One of the most important of the new and unforeseen problems that came before the administration during the year was that of arranging a new street lighting contract with the Pennamaquan Power Company. Their original price of \$3500.00 for alinight service was finally reduced, after some negotiation, to \$2800.00, a saving, each year, of \$700.00. The details of the contract were in a fair way to being worked out to the satisfaction of all parties concerned when they were interrupted by the political campaign preceding the spring election. It is better, however,

that the contract, when made, should be made by he incoming administration which will naturally have charge of putting its provisions into effect.

Taxation

The problem of taxation is a most pressing one. Through the operation of conditions extending back in their origin some five or six years, the collection of taxes has become increasingly difficult; and it is becoming a matter of settled policy on the part of some taxpayers not to meet their obligations to the city. To compel them to do so, under the present method of assessment, would be risky and uncertain, and some attention must soon be given to the correct definition or description of parcels of property on the books of the assessors, as well as to a more equable distribute tion of the tax burden. We cannot collect our taxes if the descriptions of the property taxed are incomplete or indefinite; nor can we collect them without trouble if they are manifestly unfair, as they are in some instances. Some system must be adopted also of registering and keeping account of tax titles on property sold for taxes, so that they may be realized on by the city after the expiration of the two year period during which, in accordance with law, they must be kept on file by the City.

The administration of the several departments has been kept at a high level of efficiency during the year, and to the men in charge of them I extend my hearty thanks for their faithful co-operation.

In concluding, gentlemen of the Council, I want to acknowledge the faithfulness and conscientiousness with which you have discharged your duties. I be lieve no Council in the history of the City has had a

better attendance record at its meetings than you have made, nor has given more time and thought to civic affairs, or with better results, than you have given.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Eastport:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report of the schools of the City of Eastport for the year ending January 31st, 1926.

We feel that progress has been made along all lines and that the work of the school year has on the whole been successful. The stability of the teaching staff, their interest and loyalty, and the kindly feeling of parents and other citizens toward the schools have all been factors contributing to success.

At the High School Principal Varney, Miss Lucy Kilby, Miss Helen Capen, and Miss Mildred Holmes returned this year. Miss Elsie I. Bishop succeeds Mr. Paul J. Thayer in the English Department; Miss A. Ethel Thurrott succeeds Miss E. Bessie Dennis in the French Department; and Mr. John Bromley succeeds Miss Flora Case in the Commercial Department. Changes have been made to enable the teacher of Physical Education to spend less time at the High School and to devote more time to the work of the elementary schools. Miss Winifred Brooks, a Sargent graduate, has charge of this work.

The teachers at the Grammar School are the same as last year. Early in the year, Miss Alice Milliken, while in the actual performance of school duty, received her summons from the Great Teacher. Miss Milliken had been a teacher in the lower grades of our schools for almost twenty-four years. The years of her faithful service are deeply appreciated and her going mourned. During the winter vacation, Mrs. Mina Boyden, also a teacher in the lower grades for the past five years, finished her earthly work. Bovden gave devotedly of herself to her school work and her loss is keenly felt. Miss Anna T. Murphy who for several years had been the successful principal at North End school, succeeded Miss Milliken. Miss Belle Holmes, first grade teacher at North End, acted as Principal during the winter and spring terms and Mrs. Mary Hickey filled the first grade position. At the close of the spring term Miss Murphy resigned to accept a position in New Jersey and Miss Mary Mac-Mahon was transferred to the second grade at the Primary building. Miss Isabel Wilkins was appointed to a first grade at the Primary building and Miss Doris Stuart to a third grade. At North End, Miss Edra Bayliss, who had taught the Out Island school, became principal at the beginning of the fall term with Miss Belle Holmes in charge of the first grade. At South End Mrs. Bertha Lord continues as Principal and Mrs. Mary Hickey succeeded Mrs. Boyden in the first grade. Mrs. Winifred Lee is the teacher at the Out Island School.

During the year a large number of our teachers have secured a Teacher's Certificate of Palmer Pen manship and the remainder are working for one. This certificate is secured by taking the correspondence course and examination offered by the Palmer Penmanship Company, whose writing method is used in our schools. The teachers who have secured these certificates feel repaid for the large amount of work involved in getting them.

One of the outstanding activities of this year is the installation of School Savings in our schools. This work is carried on under the direction and with the support of the Eastport Savings Bank and we wish here to publicly express our appreciation to the officials of the Bank for their cooperation, and especially to Mr. E. B. Quigley, Assistant Treasurer, whose interest and efforts have contributed largely to the success of this undertaking. Close to 80 per cent of our elementary school pupils are enrolled as depositors. and probably 60 per cent of these deposit each week.

As a large part of the work is done by pupils, lessons in business practice as well as those in thrift are taught.

During the summer vacation the North End school house was painted. Weather strips were installed on the north and west windows at the High School. We are finding these a great help in heating the large auditorium. Extensive repairs were made on the Primary school boiler. Minor repairs were made on all the buildings and all were thoroughly cleaned. Considerable work has been done on the Grammar and Primary school grounds.

With grateful acknowledgement to those who have in any way assisted to make the year's work successful, this report is respectfully submitted.

There have been a few changes in the different courses of study. Salesmanship is offered to the Juniors and Seniors taking the General and Commercial Courses. United States History and Civics is a required subject for Seniors except those taking the College Course. Geometry has been changed from the Sophomore to the Junior year. Ancient History has been added to the College and Scientific Courses in the Freshman year. Review Mathematics was offered last year to the Seniors who were planning to go to college. This gave a review of Algebra, Geometry and Solid Geometry before entering college and the reports of the college students for this year show that this study has helped them master college mathematics.

We are using the same system of marking which was adopted last year. There have been fewer cases of failure this year showing that more of the students are taking an interest in their school work. We have had very few visits from parents this year. I think it is a parent's duty to visit the schools at least once each year and discuss their children's studies with the teachers. This would bring about a better spirit of co-operation between the teachers and parents.

Forty-three pupils graduated from Shead last June. Of this number:—Four have entered the University of Maine; one has entered Hunter College of New York; two have entered Coburn Classical Institute at Waterville; two have entered Washington Normal School at Machias; one has entered Centre College of Kentucky; several of the girls are training for nurses

in various hospitals. It might be as well to add at this time that it is necessary to graduate from High School in order to enter the majority of hospitals. We have others, who graduated previous to these, in all the colleges of this state and several at other colleges.

The attendance for the fall term was 95.1 per cent. thas been higher for the few weeks of this term, due to the excellent weather. During the fall term there here 69 pupils who did not miss one session of school. The number of instances of tardiness was about one-half that of last year.

To you, Mrs. Beale, and through you to the Superintending School Committee I wish to express my appreciation of your assistance and support.
